PORTFOLIO REVIEW

The Russell 3000 benchmark's +15.4% second quarter return slightly exceeded the S&P 500's +15.2% return. Small-cap companies, as measured by the Russell 2000, rose +21.6% this quarter while the Russell Midcap Index was up +13.8%. Growth stocks led their value counterparts, with the Russell 3000 Growth rising +17.1% compared to the Russell 3000 Value's +14.0% gain. The Equal-Weight S&P 500 underperformed the headline S&P 500, providing a return of +11.4% in the quarter.

The Tributary All Cap Plus Strategy generated a second quarter return of +9.2%, trailing the Russell 3000's strong return. The market's return was dominated by technology stocks, which now constitute approximately 35% of the Russell 3000 Index. Powered by massive moves in the stocks of memory companies, the Russell 3000 technology sector delivered a +33% return, accounting for nearly two-thirds of the Russell 3000's second quarter return.

With a favorable backdrop for technology stocks, it's not surprising that the portfolio's strongest absolute return was delivered by the technology sector this quarter. Returns from MKS Instruments (+94%), Littelfuse (+34%), NVIDIA (+15%) and Apple (+14%) contributed to a +19% sector return for the portfolio. Partially offsetting these gains was portfolio holding PTC, which fell -20% as investor concerns over AI disruption indiscriminately weighed on the majority of software companies. The portfolio's technology holdings trailed the Russell 3000's technology sector, though, which had the advantage of eye-popping returns from Micron Technology (+242%), Advanced Micro Devices (+186%) and Intel (+216%). These three stocks alone accounted for nearly 20% of the Russell 3000 benchmark's overall second quarter return.

On a relative basis, the portfolio's most favorable sector returns occurred in the communication services, financials and healthcare sectors. With the benefit of a +24% quarter from Alphabet, communications provided a +13% return compared to +9% for the benchmark sector. Financials gained +12% versus +9% for the Russell 3000 sector. Healthcare rose +11% in the quarter, slightly ahead of +10% for the index.

Along with technology, the industrials and consumer staples sectors detracted from this quarter's returns. The portfolio's industrials holdings dropped -4% in the quarter, falling well short of the benchmark's +16% industrials return. Companies in the professional services industry

group (Leidos, Broadridge, Tetra Tech) were caught in the downdraft of AI uncertainty and drug portfolio returns lower. Consumer staples fell -1% in the quarter, a minor shortfall compared to the index sector's +1% gain.

PORTFOLIO CHANGES

There were two initiations and three eliminations in the All Cap Plus portfolio during the second quarter. *Quest Diagnostics* was initiated as a new position. The company is a leading provider of clinical laboratory testing and associated services. Quest's national network consists of 8,000 patient access points including 2,400 owned patient service centers and 25,000 healthcare professionals. The company's industry-leading test menu spans routine biological, gene-based and esoteric testing and anatomic pathology.

Marzetti was also added to the portfolio. The company manufactures food products including dressings, sauces, dips and breads for retail and foodservice markets. The company leverages strong customer relationships into branded product licensing agreements, providing good business visibility. We expect the company will grow through increased market share, new licensing agreements, new customer wins, margin expansion from lower input costs and optimization at new manufacturing facilities.

Becton Dickinson was eliminated during the quarter. The global medical technology company develops, manufactures and sells medical supplies, devices, laboratory equipment and diagnostic products. Proceeds from the sale were used to fund the purchase of Quest Diagnostics.

Waters Corporation was also eliminated. The manufacturer of analytical instruments and chemistry consumables for the life sciences and pharmaceutical industries had originated as a Becton Dickinson spin-off, leaving it as a relatively small position. Those proceeds were used to fund the Quest Diagnostics initiation.

Target rounded out the eliminations. Shares had rallied in 2026 and were up considerably from their 52-week low. While the valuation remains interesting, we believe the new CEO has significant work in front of him. There are positives and negatives to his long-term tenure at Target, but the near term outlook remains uncertain.

MKS Instruments, a provider of instruments and systems to semiconductor, electronics and industrial manufacturers, continues to benefit from tailwinds in its semiconductor and electronics businesses.

Littelfuse, a manufacturer of fuses and other circuit protection components, reported a strong quarter, exceeding sales expectations across all business segments and returning operating margins to the company's targeted range. At its May 14th investor day, Littelfuse raised its organic and acquisition growth outlook and outlined a three-to-five percentage point margin improvement target by 2030.

Alphabet, the parent company of Google, reported strong performance and accelerating growth across its platform due to AI's positive impacts. Cloud backlog nearly doubled and its Search business increased due to expanding AI use.

NVIDIA continues to benefit from AI and datacenter trends, and high capital spending levels. Quarterly results and outlook handily beat consensus estimates.

Apple reported strong results, driven by iPhone and services. Higher memory input costs are a potential concern, and Apple recently implemented selective price increases as a result.

Tractor Supply Company, a rural lifestyle retailer, came under pressure after softness in its companion animal segment drove same-store sales and EPS below expectations.

Leidos, an engineering and IT services firm, reported strength in its businesses supporting the intelligence community, energy infrastructure and air traffic management. This was offset by concerns regarding margins in its healthcare business due to upcoming contract recompetes, and general malaise surrounding services businesses and the unknown impact of AI initiatives.

PTC, an engineering and product development software company, is navigating a challenging sentiment environment as investor concerns over AI disruption continue to weigh on valuations across the broader software sector. In mid-June, Jeff Bezos publicly discussed his backing of Prometheus, a project aimed at applying AI to engineering, manufacturing and physical-world design challenges.

Chevron was negatively impacted by a U.S.-Iran memorandum of understanding that reopened tanker traffic through the Strait of Hormuz, easing global oil supply constraints and sending oil prices down 31% during the quarter amid ongoing longer-term negotiations.

Abbott Laboratories, a manufacturer of diagnostic products, nutritional products and medical devices, reported slightly lower growth expectations from its legacy businesses, including disruptions in the Middle East due to the ongoing Iran conflict, and a weaker flu season that led to lower than expected diagnostics growth.
